

Pork Hill Farm is looking for apprentices and farm workers for the 2018 growing season. We are located in beautiful Ossipee, New Hampshire. In the Lakes Region of New Hampshire, we enjoy working and living where others come to spend a week on vacation.

Pork Hill Farm is a certified organic vegetable farm growing on about 7 acres. We have a CSA (Community Supported Agriculture) and deliver to grocery stores and restaurants, florists, and other wholesale buyers. We are part of a cooperative Winter CSA. We are production oriented and offer an excellent opportunity for learning how to make a lot of food on a little land. We do most of our work by hand but use our tractors to prep our fields and do other heavy lifting.

We participate in a local CRAFT (Collaborative Regional Alliance for Farmer Training) program to enhance the learning opportunities of apprentices by visiting other area farms to view and hear about their diverse growing practices. A local grange hall intermittently hosts concerts and community events in our neighborhood. We've seen some amazing shows here in the middle of the northern forest.

This is our tenth growing season and we hope you'll join us. Carroll County, NH is a beautiful place to live and work. The farm is surrounded by hundreds of acres of forested conservation land. Mountains and lakes and rivers and hiking and swimming are short drives in all directions.

We are looking for apprentices who can work with us from April to November or May to September, although we are somewhat flexible about the time-frame. Apprentices work on all aspects of the farm and are paid a stipend from \$150 - \$300. Housing and produce from the farm are provided. Winter work and housing are available.

We hire local, part-time help at an hourly rate depending on experience and skills.
